The past 10 months have been nothing short of unimaginable. As COVID-19 has literally shut down the world, SBC continues to make a strong impact as we empower servant leaders to follow Jesus, serve the church, and engage the world.

Our continued emphasis on providing a strong biblical foundation in a Christ-Centred community is meeting the needs of our students. This past fall, we have seen record number of students attending our classes. Over 125 students are coming to study on campus for credit this fall, with an additional 85 students studying either online, in Winnipeg or auditing courses. In all, over 210 students are enrolled at SBC this fall semester. We have not seen this high enrollment since 1961.

This year we are working hard at strengthening our Marketplace program.

Our desire is to prepare students to share the love of Jesus where they work, as well as in the church and overseas. In summer we hired Terry Kaufman to give us leadership to this program. Terry comes with a wealth of experience in business as well as pastoring in the church.

Finally, I want to thank you for your faithfulness. So many of you mention that SBC is part of your regular prayers. Thank you! Many have been faithful in supporting us financially. We need this during this time of COVID, as our costs have increased in adjusting to the challenges COVID has brought us. God's faithfulness has been evident throughout the year. Please join me in praising Him for guidance, safety and provisions.

Graduation 2020



Postponed from April until October 17, grads and select close family and friends safely gathered at Quarry Oaks Golf Course to celebrate their achievements amidst a season of great unknowns before restrictions tightened up for a second lockdown.

Valedictorian, Justin Marchand, was able to address his fellow grads at the outdoor ceremony.

I would like to begin by saying thank you to all the people who made this achievement possible. Thank you to those who organized this event, to those who consistently work so hard to make SBC the special place that it is, and to those who have encouraged and supported the members of the graduating class over the years. This achievement does not belong to the graduates alone, but to everyone who has contributed to our success.

To graduate is certainly a triumph, but celebrating graduation remains a strange practice. By nature, graduation is also a transition, in this case between our time at SBC and the future, whatever it may hold. As I speak, the graduating class is officially transitioning out of the way things have been, into the way things will be, like we are walking through a doorway between two rooms. Our time at SBC was in the room behind, the future lies in the room ahead, and we are currently transitioning between the two.

The thought that occurred to me was, if graduation is like walking through a doorway between two rooms, then celebrating graduation must be like throwing a party in that doorway. In your life, have you ever stopped in any doorway and thought to yourself, *"Wow, what a great location for a party!"* Of course not! And if I sent you an invitation to a party, taking place in the doorway between my kitchen and the bathroom, you would probably think I was a crazy person.

That is why I say that celebrating graduation remains a strange practice. In a way, its like we are celebrating in a transitional space, the place between places, neither here nor there, in limbo. And this particular graduation celebration is even stranger because, for most of the graduates, it probably feels like

we have already had to venture into the room beyond SBC, and in a way, have had to come backwards to be here today.

I suppose my point is, simply put, that today is a bit of a weird day. And yet, I know that today is also an important day. It is an important day because we do need to have moments like these in between the past and the future: to breathe, to feel proud of our accomplishments and to be thankful to God for his faithfulness, to be together, and to feel a little sad for the many wonderful times that are sealed in the past.

As I was reflecting on the last few years at SBC, there were many moments that came to my mind that brought a smile to my face. I thought of Mission Exposure 3 in the Philippines, the gathering of the Old Fogies every Wednesday to do homework, Eric dying his beard purple right before he was set to preach, and Levi running through the halls with a cup of coffee, always 1 minute late for everything. I remember the Box Socials, the CGL Retreats, how amazing Free Servant was, the Dorm NERF Battles, Zoom School, and of course, the fact that nearly half of the graduating class decided to get engaged over this last year.

SBC is a special place, and not just because the environment is conducive for romance.

It is a place where people find great community, where they grow in Biblical knowledge and understanding, and where they encounter the work of the Holy Spirit, and I will always cherish the time that I spent enrolled at this school with this group of students.

And even though many of the members of the graduating class have already had to venture into the room ahead, due to the delay for this ceremony, we never do truly know what lies before us. The future could be bright, but it could also be very difficult, or a little of both; bittersweet, like this moment is. Despite the unknown, there are a few things that I believe to be true. I believe that this group of graduates have bought into the commitment to live out their calling as servant leaders: to follow Jesus, serve the church, and engage the world into the future, whatever may come. I believe that the Lord our God goes ahead of us and is with us, and that he will never leave us nor forsake us.

And I believe that the very best way to do justice to the room behind you and to prepare for the room ahead, is to allow yourself to feel the combination of fulfillment, thankfulness, sadness, and uncertainty that comes with life's transitional moments, and to trust God with the future. God is good and merciful, and He will take care of us, whatever may come after this weird, sort of late, metaphorical party in the doorway. 📍

A Call to the Marketplace

"I like work; it fascinates me. I can sit and look at it for hours."

"I do not like work even when someone else is doing it."

“Work” does not always get favourable press. It is often viewed as a necessary evil, simply there to provide for our leisure, which is erroneously understood to be the goal of life. But that was never God’s intent. From the very beginning work was a part of the good creation in Eden. Mark Twain was wrong when he said: *“Let us be grateful to Adam: he cut us out of the blessing of idleness and won for us the curse of labor.”* Labor in the garden was not a curse, though the curse of the fall later impacted labor. In fact, working the land was part of God’s design before the fall. Work was one of the first tasks given to humanity as part of the perfection of the Garden of Eden.

Gen 2:15 says, *“The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it.”*

*When God wanted sponges and oysters He made them and put one on a rock and the other in the mud. When He made man He did not make him to be a sponge or an oyster; He made him with feet and hands, and head and heart, and vital blood, and a place to use them and He said to him,
“Go work.”*

For too long we have not treated work, especially work outside of the church, with the respect and sense of calling it deserves. Marketplace work, professional careers, and vocational labour have sometimes been viewed as less honorable or less spiritual than the calling to work inside of a church or a mission agency. But the Bible knows of no such distinctions. The truth is that you find farmers in the Garden of Eden but not pastors and teachers. This does not in any way invalidate God’s calling to pastors and teachers, but it does help us understand the value of marketplace and professional workspaces. In God’s economy all our

work is a response to, and expression of, our relationship with God and a part of building his kingdom.

*There is no work, however vile or sordid,
that does not glisten before God.*

Indeed all work can be a calling from God. That means that **marketplace** is ministry, or at least, it should be. Granted, it is a different kind of ministry, less “organizational” than it is “organic.” But still it is, and should, be ministry, as a platform for the advancement of the work of God and for the expression of the love of God.

Truett Cathy, founder of Chick-fil-A once said, “Chick-fil-A is not a church or a ministry; I’m not going to put scripture on packaging or on the bottom of cups. We’re not going to put evangelical material in our restaurants. I want people to discover what we believe because of how we treat them. Jesus didn’t say, ‘I expect you to be a bullhorn.’ He said, ‘I expect you to be salt. I expect you to be light.’” “I have never seen a conflict between biblical principles and good business practise. Where my career was not just a job but a platform to serve others and to serve Christ, not as an evangelist or a preacher or a teacher, but as a businessman attempting to live out the gospel of grace and truth.”

As a “platform to serve others and to serve Christ,” I would suggest Chick-fil-A is a ministry in the most important of ways. “Marketplace” done right is ministry.

Our less than robust picture of Marketplace ministry requires that we need to increase our attention and equipping for such “works of service” (Eph 4:12). The works of service that build up the body of Christ are not found only within the walls

of the local church, they can also be found behind the sales counter, in the board rooms, in the carpenter's or mechanic's shop, in the sales offices of marketplace and in professional environments. And it is important for Christian leaders to be equipped for that ministry.

That is the acknowledgment and burden that is at the heart of the Marketplace and Ministry Leadership program at Steinbach Bible College. It is our task to equip servants of God in whatever vocation God calls them. Most of our graduates will end up serving in vocations outside of the church. Additionally, there are scores of people serving as marketplace leaders, entrepreneurs, service providers, and professionals who want to be better at serving God by serving others in those places.

It is our hope that our Marketplace and Ministry Leadership program will communicate to existing marketplace ministers the value of that ministry. God is using you, and wants to use you, right where you are -- maybe especially where you are. Marketplace ministers have opportunities a pastor will never have.

In recognizing the role marketplace leaders play in God's work advancing His kingdom, Steinbach Bible College continues to develop our Marketplace and Ministry Leadership studies through several offerings.

First of all, students in a variety of programs are given the opportunity to have some "marketplace as mission" training included in their program. This is intended to help students understand the missional opportunities in marketplace and professional environments, equipping them with an understanding of the biblical value of work, a Christian worldview to

anchor them, and insight to know how to use such a worldview in an effective way in their vocational environment.

Secondly, SBC offers 1, 2 and 3 year programs that focus on Marketplace Ministry. We are even able to combine these studies with some specific technical programs students may take in other institutions to equip them to serve in specialized environments. SBC can help students grapple with a variety of issues that will impact their workplace: ethics, environment, evangelism, pastoral care, and more – all part of applying a Christian worldview in an effective way in the workplace.

Thirdly, people who are already active and serving in the marketplace, or in a professional environment, are invited to take classes to help them grow as marketplace ministers and leaders. To make this accessible, some of our marketplace courses will be available in evenings or online.

Then finally, we are hoping to develop opportunities for marketplace internships where students can learn "hands on" from Christian leaders who are in serving in their marketplaces and vocations.

So how might this impact you more directly?

Well, firstly, you are invited to consider taking a class on Marketplace Ministry. This winter we will have a **"Business (Marketplace) as Mission" evening class running for 4 consecutive Thursday evenings starting January 14th.** This course can be taken for credit or as an audit. We also have a full 3 credit hour course on "Intro to Marketplace" that will be running from January to April. These are by no means limited to people

in a specific chapter of life or to full-time students of SBC. Whatever chapter of life you may be in you can benefit from joining a class to help you grow and learn in your ministry. And younger class members will be blessed by your participation and insights. You can also join the 2021 SBC Leadership Conference on March 19 & 20. Watch for upcoming details, but this is a great opportunity to increase your skills as a Marketplace Minister. As a Marketplace leader we also ask you to consider encouraging your staff or co-workers to take a course or program, and maybe even help facilitate that for an individual by supporting them.

Secondly, you can be ready to embrace students who will be entering the workforce. If you have interest in “interning” students within your workplace I would ask you to reach out to us. I also encourage you to consider being a mentor to someone and help to multiply godly leadership.

I also invite you to talk to me about your experience if you serve in the marketplace or in a professional environment. Our program will only get stronger as we hear from you about your needs, your ideas, and your experiences. You can also support what we doing by financially supporting the ministry of SBC. Help us equip people to serve God in all the places He sends us.

Finally, we want to encourage you to accept the call you have from God into the career or business you are involved in. Make your work, whatever form it is, a testimony to Jesus.

Yester-years alumni support students today and we are deeply grateful of their committed support.

Like the Kehler Family, with their unique story.

Being raised in Southern Manitoba, **DARRELL KEHLER** had a transformational experience with Christ at the age of 16 and decided to commit 1-year to SBC. Partially through his first year he decided to continue on with a 3-year degree with a focus on Missions and to discover God's purpose for his life.

Little did he realize the impact Professor Gord Penner would have on his life and the Mathew 28: 18 - 20 call to ministry: *"Then Jesus came to them and said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the*

With his children attending SBC, he was impressed with the foundational Biblical training they were receiving. He told Darrell that as soon as his church would open up the opportunity to take a semester of classes, he would attend SBC as well. Allen joined his son Darrell in his second year at SBC.

He liked that SBC teaches more about the Bible and noted, “There are not enough colleges that teach the Bible.” He and his children had different objectives. Allen’s were practical. As his kids told him, “Dad

you’re using what you are learning, we are hoping we pass!”


Allen has pastored for over 30 years and is now assisting other ministries and often fills in as interim pastor.

Ben D. Reimer School of Leadership

As the longest serving President of SBC, setting the direction for SBC from 1945 to 1966, Ben D. Reimer solidified SBC's reputation as a place people came for spiritual growth and training. Numerous graduates during his era left SBC for the mission field or to pastor churches.

Today, SBC continues to train up servant leaders for Jesus Christ, preparing students to enter the mission field, pastor churches, and impact the marketplace.

The Ben D. Reimer School of Leadership was established to provide affordable ministry experience for those students who are called by God to enter into ministry upon graduation. These students will have the opportunity to experience the practical side of ministry; be that in a church or overseas on the mission field, without the hindrance of large student loans.

SBC's goal is to grow the School of Leadership endowment to \$1,000,000.

This will enable SBC to assist numerous graduates each year to serve in the local church or mission field.



2019-2020 Presidential Report




Where Our Students Were From 2019-2020



Academic Report

SBC faculty realized quickly that 2020 is not an average year. With new COVID restrictions, we made all classes available live and on Microsoft Teams videoconferencing. Many classes had a “cloud of witnesses” watching us from a TV screen in the back of the class. Classes sizes were reduced to provide space for social distancing. Spring 2020 graduation was held on October 17th, shortly before further restrictions descended on us. The grads seemed grateful to walk across the green grass outdoor stage at the Quarry Oaks golf course, although some commented on its strangeness.

Back in college, faculty welcomed our newest members, Terry Kaufman in Marketplace studies and Jeff Neufeld as Free Servant band instructor. The drama, *Pride and Prejudice*, was almost performed until code red put the production on hold until after New Years.

With all the instability, course enrollments have been the highest in a decade. Students and faculty have been very gracious with each other this semester. God has been patiently teaching me how to let go of expectations and my own understanding and to better understand grace and faithfulness I’ve learned to see the blessings of God and how much He loves us in the middle of this strange season. We are blessed every day.


