A Year in Review

The theme for this year was “As We Wait” from 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 urging followers of Jesus to, *“Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God’s will for you in Christ Jesus.”* After this year we hope that rejoicing, prayer, and thanks are buried deep within our souls.

Signs posted throughout the college said, Please be patient. This is my first pandemic. By September, the COVID-19 pandemic was into its sixth month. Staff and students were now becoming veterans in adjusting to ever changing health directives. Adapt, adapt, adapt is what we did to give students the opportunity to learn with reduced class sizes and on Microsoft Teams. The All-College Retreat moved to Winkler Bible Camp to provide more space for a distancing student body.

Faculty did a fantastic job of teaching in challenging situations from using three formats per course (live, hybrid, online),

to managing overflow classrooms, and fluctuating student attendance. We thank the Lord that faculty did not miss a day of teaching because of illness!

On November 12, classes went fully on Teams-online as most students and faculty returned home. We finished the semester waiting for signs to return. In January, students started online for one week and waited to return as live classes resumed January 25.

With COVID disruptions and distractions, students faced new learning challenges. We learned to adapt and offer grace to more students. Josh Dueck started an evening study group called Journeying Together to encourage and motivate students feeling isolated and unmotivated to learn. A list of just a few of the adaptations:

- Pursuit discipleship program went on pause, waiting for a fresh start with

a Fall 2021 camp focused team and a Winter 2022 cross-cultural focused team.

- Chapels moved fully online and kept the community together. We waited until the end of March for corporate gatherings and singing to return—briefly.
- Free Servant, our worship band adapted and produced several excellent recordings of worship songs. Churches may request the recordings to play for online services.
- Impact went online and reached over 30 youth groups in February and March.
- The Pride and Prejudice drama shifted to video performance in March reaching an estimated 1000 people.
- International Mission X gave students opportunities to engaged in faith conversations online.
- Mission X North produced videos for communities not accessible this year.
- Mission X Winnipeg did welcome students to serve for a few days in the inner city.

- Students and faculty finished the year with retreats for reflection and spiritual renewal at three camps. We had hoped to end the year together, and it was worth the wait!

SBC celebrated the graduation 38 students on April 24, 2021 as restrictions increased—again. When we announced the adapted plans for grad, students laughed! By now they knew that this grad would be a story for the generations.

As We Wait for next year, we rejoice in the Lord with the hope of returning to live classes next fall. We pray for students to sense the call to discipleship through learning God's Word. We give thanks for faculty and staff committed to making 2021-22 a year of spiritual renewal. 📍

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Graduation 2021

Steinbach Bible College celebrated the graduating class of 2021 with a live-streamed celebration over April 23 – 24. A total of 38 graduates were recognized with seven Certificate of Biblical studies, nine Associate of Arts, and 22 Bachelor of Arts degrees.

With the third wave of COVID-19 looming in Manitoba ahead of the official graduation date, Provincial restrictions in place and more likely coming down the pipe, the task was set to celebrate SBC's graduates while also maintaining safety and adhering to the Provincial Health guidelines.

After many altered plans and sacrifices of "tradition" with no spring concert, banquet, or friends and family-filled seats, a much-scaled back celebration took place privately among students and staff with each awards chapel, celebration chapel, and conferring of degrees (with three allowed guests per graduate to witness the conferring) being live-streamed for supporting family and friends from across the campus, province, country, and globe to "attend" safely. Each chapel was held twice over with half of the graduates being recognized each time to keep numbers within provincial guidelines.

"Graduation serves as a time to reflect on the growth and maturing of our students. What greater satisfaction can I have than to see students grow in their relationship with Jesus, be eager to serve the church, and have a passion to engage the world," reflects SBC President Rob Reimer.

Studying in the midst of a pandemic has certainly presented itself with numerous difficulties that our students adapted to with admirable grace. Students adjusted from being able to be out "in the world" making a difference, to learning how they can make a difference from where they are. Service and ministry were re-imagined in various ways and the sentiment of the lessons this taught them was evident in the conversations you'd hear about between students and their faculty advisors.

"We are graduating from a college that has fostered and developed our love for the

Word, and the Lord, and for His people," said 2021 class valedictorian, Andrew Reimer, BA Christian Studies (*pictured left*), who addressed his fellow grads and online viewers during Saturday's Celebration Chapel.

He continues, "Wherever our separate paths lead, as we scatter from here, I want to encourage us to follow through on these things; to commit to using what we have learned to follow Christ in tangible actions. Choose Him and live like it."

The commencement address was given by Trudy Dueck (*pictured below*), a 1980 BA graduate of SBC. Dueck, who served on the SBC Board for 6 years (4 of which were as Chairperson) and was part of the hiring team of current SBC President, Rob Reimer, encouraged the graduates to "occupy" the land the Lord has given them. "I challenge you, be a faithful presence in your neighbourhoods, wherever you are," Dueck says. She continues, "Do business there, live incarnational lives. Look for ways to do justice and love mercy. Occupy that neighbourhood and spread the love of the Kingdom of God. As you wait, occupy until He comes."

President Reimer concluded, "I wait with anticipation, to hear of your journey beyond SBC and a life of continued service, for the sake of the Kingdom." 📍

SBC Appoints Indigenous Student Advisor

SBC is pleased to appoint Josh Dueck as Indigenous Student Advisor. Dueck reflects on the importance of this appointment as SBC desires to press forward with the vision of “Multicultural graduates serving in meaningful vocations and making followers of Jesus.”

“There are two things that we must never stop learning: The Bible and other Cultures. Learning the Bible forms us to love and follow Jesus in increasing measures and learning other cultures forms us to love God’s image bearers and develop meaningful relationships also in increasing measures.”

A careful reader will notice that above quote does not say “learning about the Bible” or “about other cultures,” though neither of those are bad. The quote, which is from my first year New Testament Professor from fifteen years ago, is intentionally emphasising relationships. Relationship with God and relationships with people. Relationships are not formed when we know about God only or about people only, rather they are formed when we are present with God and present with people.

A great highlight from my first semester working at SBC was connecting with Indigenous students, Indigenous alumni, and Indigenous Christian leaders. It is not

surprising to me that all three of these groups also emphasized relationships. Nearly every person who achieved their personal goals while at Bible College (whether at SBC or a different Bible College) credited it to a meaningful relationship with a faculty member. Unfortunately, as often is the case when working cross-culturally, students who did not achieve their personal goals noted being lonely, isolated, and unable to identify or connect with people in meaningful ways.

I am reminded of Joseph’s narrative from Genesis. How, after being reconciled with his family, he was able to stand in the gap between the Egyptian and Hebrew people.

I wish I could think of lesser examples since I am certainly not claiming, implying, or suggesting being like Joseph, or of any similarities between the cultures. However, as an Indigenous Cree person who grew up in the dominate culture, yet not being *of* the dominate culture, I give God glory for the grace, favour, and opportunity to float well between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people.

I am encouraged by SBC's acknowledgment and recognition that more can and should be done to empower, mutually partner with, and learn from being in relationships with Indigenous people – for the sake of the Gospel.

It is this reason that I am eager to add to my portfolio here at SBC **Indigenous Student Advisor**. We trust this is one of many small God honoring steps in our journey of empowering servant leaders to follow Jesus, serve the church and engage the world. 📍

Q&A with Youth Ministry Graduates

Getting to know our alumni and their current service.

We connected with Peter Klassen, a 2008 Youth Ministry graduate and Jonathan Neufeld, a 2017 Youth Ministry graduate. Klassen and Neufeld are both currently serving at Deer Run Church in Leamington, Ontario.

SBC: Tell me a little about yourself, family life, recreational life etc?

Peter Klassen: My name is Peter Klassen, I'm an associate pastor at Deer Run Church. I have been married to my wife Maria for 17 years and we have 4 children. I enjoy creating films, recording music, and playing drums. I have been doing youth ministry as a pastor for about 12 years here at Deer Run Church.



Jonathan Neufeld: My name is Jonathan Neufeld, but most people just know me as Jona. I got married back in 2018 to my amazing wife Esther, and we are expecting our first child in November. Over the past few years I've grown to love the game of golf, I drink a ton of coffee, and when I have time I like to build things out of wood.



SBC: What do you do for fun?

PK: One of my favourite things to do is watch movies and film stuff.

JN: What I do for fun looks different depending on the season, but I love watching hockey and playing Chel (NHL). I also love sitting around a fire and enjoying time with friends. It doesn't take much to make something fun.

SBC: What do you do for personal growth?

PK: For personal growth I enjoy reading and spending time in nature by myself.

JN: For personal growth, the best thing that I've had the privilege of is teaching what I'm learning. I learn a lot from personal time in scripture, but I find that I learn the most when plan for a sermon or Bible study, and then get to teach it afterwards. Other ways that I've been able to grow personally is through conversation, whether it be with other pastors, in life groups, or with friends.

SBC: What led you into ministry at Deer Run church?

PK: My home church is the only church that would accept my resume! I caused a bit of trouble at the previous church I went to as a young person and was, obviously, rejected. I didn't make the cut at another church I tried out at and resigned to working in a warehouse after Bible College. During that time I volunteered as a youth leader at Deer Run Church where pastor Ike Unger (youth pastor at the time) mentored me. Soon, he moved onto a different role at church leaving it open for me to fill the new youth pastor role.

JN: Deer Run Church is my home church and I've attended it since I was born, so I can't pinpoint a moment that led me to ministry here as I think it's been a gradual

process. From young on I've been invested in Deer Run, whether it be in Sunday School or in my teen years. I have found that the leadership at Deer Run, over my 28 years there, has been intentional in investing into young leaders which creates buy-in.

SBC: How is the Lord leading you in this interesting season?

PK: The Lord is leading me in this interesting season by focusing on leading smaller. Small groups more frequently are approaches that are working for us.

JN: During this time there have been many highs and many lows, and during all of it I've continually been reminded of God's grace. At the end of the day, we as leaders in the church all want what's best for the congregation, and though we may not all agree with what each church is doing, the heart behind what we do should be Christ. So as leaders I think this means we must be real, we have to be vulnerable, and it means we have to be willing to allow the Spirit to guide us.

SBC: What challenges are you facing and how are you navigating them?

PK: Exhaustion. Doing youth 4 times a night is not easy. Finding volunteers during this time under these circumstances is also difficult. I'm trying to manage my time carefully and prioritizing my family as a result. Keeping teens interested has always been difficult, especially Jr High teens. We have an experiential approach to Jr Youth that engages them with God's word. We take trips to the beach, forests, and marshes in order to engage with God's creation and experience His goodness.

JN: I think one of the greatest challenges I'm facing while leading youth and young adults is the loss of community. Throughout my childhood and into adulthood I've had

the luxury of being surrounded by amazing people in my life such as friends, mentors, and parents. I had a youth group that was always together, and if I ever needed anything we could simply just meet up anywhere. This sense of community has been stripped away. Online is great, but it doesn't replace human interaction.

We've had to be creative over the past year, but I think the best thing we have been able to do during this time is stay consistent. We've been restricted with size and with the things we can do, but I think the best thing we've done is just stay consistent, having something available week after week. We have dedicated leaders that continue to pour out their time and energy, and we've been able to encourage healthy spiritual formation even when life seems crazy.



SBC: How important was/is mentoring to you? Is there an example you can share?

PK: Mentoring is very important to me. I have accumulated many mentors over the years and value them deeply. They pour into me, and give me correction when I need it. People in my position are constantly depositing into other peoples lives and are always in need of others to pour love, wisdom, and instruction.

JN: I think having a mentor is crucial in our faith. It's someone to have an open ear,

it's someone to gain wisdom from, it's an example of Christian character. Pastor Peter was a great role model to me as my youth pastor and friend. He was there for support and to challenge me. I believe if I didn't have my youth leaders in my teen years to encourage me, I don't think I would be where I am today. I also remember Professor Garth Friesen offering students to be their mentor, and for the last year or so of my schooling at SBC I would meet with him regularly and that helped keep me grounded as I tried to balance my life as a student.

Currently I'm blessed to be working in an environment where I am surrounded by several pastors who continually pour into me and have helped me grow in the role of being a pastor.

SBC: What was your time at SBC like?

PK: SBC was the catalyst God used to mobilize my faith and give direction to my heart. The focus on missions and mentorship set the table for a ministry model that could fit any 'container'. Small church, para-church, mega-church, etc. My relationships from SBC have been one of my greatest assets in my ministry as I now am partnering with ministries throughout the entire world. Whether it be sending people to *Belize Camping Experience*, or creating ministry films with people like Richard Klassen and Jeff Kraun from another province.



JN: If I had to sum up my time at SBC in one word it would be: growth. When I originally applied to SBC, my intentions were simply to get away from normal life a little while and hopefully grow in my faith in the process. I grew more than I could have ever anticipated. When I started, I would say my knowledge of the bible was fairly basic, and though I wasn't much of a student, I was able to learn a ton. What I like about SBC is what we learned was not just head knowledge, it's learning to live out your faith.

I think the thing that will always stick out to me the most is the emphasis of community. Living in dorm was one the best experiences in my life. There is something special about living in a building full of Christ followers who are all there for the same reason, which is to grow in their faith. There was always someone there who cared for you.

SBC: Which professor impacted you and why?

PK: Professor Garth Friesen impacted me. He poured into me when I was navigating some dark places in my life as student. He took the time to pour into my marriage and also made sure I was connected with a mentor even after moving away from SBC. It's encouraging to know that even after graduating in 2008, I am still being contacted by professors like Garth Friesen to see how I am doing and further pour into my life.

JN: I would say I had 3 professors who had the largest impact on me. Professor Garth Friesen (Youth Ministry), Professor Patrick Friesen (formerly Worship Arts), and Professor Gord Penner (Old Testament).

Garth was the one who helped guide me into this role of youth ministry, and he pushed me to go out of my comfort

zone. I was given the opportunity to host Impact (the Senior Youth Discipleship Retreat) twice, something that I thought I would never be able to do, but he saw my potential and encouraged me in this.

Patrick became somewhat of an uncle to me while there as I was an out-of-province student. He would often invite me over for a meal or just a chance to hangout and watch a game.

Gord became someone who I turned to when I needed some wisdom and direction. I would often stop by his office just to chat, and I'll never forget the words he told me when I was looking to pursue ministry. Gord said, "Don't limit yourself to only youth ministry." I'm often reminded of these words when I have doubts or when opportunities arise. If God wants to use us somewhere, we need to be willing to go.

I cherish the heart to heart conversations and the willingness they had to be real with students.

SBC: What can you share to others reading this about "pressing on towards the goal"?

PK: The times change, God doesn't. The world grows darker, the gospel is still the light. The Empires of this world may establish themselves, but God's Kingdom is shinning through. Amidst the chaos of a morphing landscape God's commission stands firm beckoning us to press on towards the goal because God is far from finished. And we are a part of this plan. Don't forget your calling!

JN: Currently I'm leading a series in our young adults group going through the book of 1 Corinthians and I love what Paul says in chapter 2:2, "For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus and him crucified." As we continue to

preach the gospel and further the kingdom of heaven, let us not take our eyes off the truth of the gospel which is Jesus and his crucifixion.

SBC: What is your favourite scripture verse at this time?

PK: At the time being 1 John 3:2-3, *“Beloved, we are God’s children, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. And everyone who thus hopes in him purifies himself as he is pure.”*

JN: John 15:5 - *“I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from my you can do nothing.”*

SBC: Do you have favourite a quote?

PK: *“The great masquerade of evil has played havoc with all our ethical concepts. For evil to appear disguised as light, charity, historical necessity, or social justice is quite bewildering to anyone brought up on our traditional ethical concepts, while for the Christian who bases his life on the Bible, it merely confirms the fundamental wickedness of evil.”*

The existing Winter session, which was deferred for the 2020-2021 season due to COVID-19, will continue to focus on outreach opportunities through local service projects, urban ministry, and the final trip to Brazil to partner with Quest Brazil.*

Krahn adds, "I can't wait to see Pursuit students grow spiritually, develop as leaders, and discover their own gifts and passions through outdoor adventure, experiential learning, and road trips in this new session!"
